This city is laid out with its streets running North and South, and Avenues East and West. The dividing line of the streets running North and South is Main. Those streets parallel with Main and West of it are: Manning, Menor, Mansfield, Stewart, Lowry and Read Street. Those parallel with Main and East of it, are: Millington, Loomis, Fuller, Andrews, Bliss, Platter, Maris, Davis, Thompson and Cherry Streets.

The Avenues run East and West are numbered from the North, commencing at 5th avenue and extending to twelfth avenue, they are then called Streets and run as follows: Blanden, Court House, Maple, Walnut, Park and Osage.

There are also other short streets as Walton, extending from 8th to 9th av, and West of Stewart; Third and Fourth Streets in the Northeast part of the city
